EU report – Progress by potential new members

WHAT'S THE ISSUE?

The Commission is required by EU governments to report annually on progress achieved by countries that are official **candidates or potential candidates** for EU membership.

This monitoring process ensures that future Member States are admitted only when they have met all the requirements for joining.

The main reports produced are the:

- **annual strategy document** outlining the Commission's approach to the common challenges facing the countries and setting out a way forward for each of them.
- progress reports dedicated assessment for each (potential) candidate country of their progress in the last year.

WHICH COUNTRIES ARE CONCERNED?

Official membership candidates

- Turkey (negotiations opened in 2005)
- Iceland (negotiations opened in 2010, currently on hold)
- Montenegro (negotiations opened in 2012)
- Serbia (negotiations opened in January 2014)
- The former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia (official candidate since 2005)
- Albania (official candidate since June 2014)

Potential membership candidates

- Bosnia and Herzegovina
- Kosovo*

WHAT WILL BE THE CONSEQUENCE OF THESE REPORTS?

At EU level

- The strategy paper will provide the basis for a **debate** among member governments in the EU Council.
- The governments will then decide at their summit in December 2014 about possible **next steps** towards EU membership on the basis of each country's merits. Any such decision has to be unanimous.

In the candidate countries

- Each will receive a clear indication of the current **state of play** and challenges ahead regarding its efforts to join.
- The Commission will continue to help each country **implement** the necessary reforms.
